It is a matter of great pleasure and honor for me to present
this XIX Annual Report of Maulana Azad National Urdu
University (MANUU) narrating its achievements and accomplishments during for the year 2016 - 17.

This was a year of milestones as we are progressing through academic and administrative reforms, while being accredited with 'A' grade by NAAC and enlisted in the band of 101-150 among the Universities under NIRF - 2017 for our accomplishments during 2016-17 and also received INTACH Award for Ecoconservation. Further, it was also considered as a year of challenge and change, for academic and administrative performance but at the same time, the work of all stakeholders of the university gained significant recognition. The University has the distinction of offering academic programs in all forms of education consisting of general, professional, technical and vocational streams and also showcases the uniqueness of delivering instruction through Urdu medium in both formal and nonformal mode.

#### **Activities**:

At academic front, the regular mode of programs are imparted through 7 Schools of Studies consisting of 24 Departments. These Departments offer 72 Programs and Courses, (21 Ph.D.; 14 M.Phil.; 21 PG; 10 UG and 6 Diploma and 5 Certificate) in addition to 5 each Polytechnic and ITI trades.

Whereas the research and training mainly focuses on promotion of Urdu Language, Culture and Heritage through Center for Promotion of Knowledge in Urdu, Center for Professional Development of Urdu Medium Teachers, Center for Urdu Culture Studies and Center for Deccan Studies. In addition to these, the research is also mainstreamed to address the issues of social inclusion and gender equity through UGC supported schemes of Center for Social Exclusion and Inclusive Policy and Center for Women Studies. Further, the University introduced Minor Research Project Scheme on the lines of UGC to expand its research base. Also, the effective Governance is in place to gear up to the needs and also maintains accountability with established structures. MANUU prepares its students for learning of Urdu Language as a Knowledge Promotion by connecting them with disconnected life experiences. This enables to enrich thought process of what it is to interpret and make sense of things while inculcating the culture of tolerance, inclusiveness, love and peace. Further, it will enhances the awareness of one's own understanding and confrontations with the world to sustain himself as responsible global citizen.

#### **Initiatives:**

MANUU introduced a bridge course for providing access to Madrasa students for entering into mainstream education as also to enhance Gross Enrollment Ratio (GER). It implemented the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in both UG and PG programs offered under regular mode and formalized the MoU processes for strategic network partnership with national and international agencies. A Planning and Development section was established to act as a Nodal Agency for Plan schemes and also to work in coordination with various academic and administrative units to realize the vision, mission and objectives of the university.

#### **Best Practices:**

Various intervention processes are in vogue for recognizing and balancing the needs and expectations of different stakeholders on priority basis. Further, the University believes in student empowerment through provision of support systems and expansion of progressive measures. MANUU is part of Mission mode directives of MHRD such as Swacch Bharat Abhiyan; Swacch Bharat - Swasth Bharat; Swatchhata Pakhwada; Ek Bharat - Shreshtha Bharat; Beti Bachao - Beti Padao; Vittiya Shaksharat Abhiyan and PM Kaushal Vikas Yojana; in addition to Digital India project of NKN - NME - ICT, which includes Campus Connect, UGC-INFLIBNET, NDL Cluster, SWAYAM, Bharatvani etc.

To increase the student capacity to meet the growing demands of competent manpower in national and international markets



- Creating a vibrant learning environment through various infrastructure expansion activities and outreach programs; Transforming the University into a sustainable ecocampus to establish a management framework for conservation measures in terms of environment, energy and water that creates an impact on national culture and policy;
- National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) accredited MANUU with 'A Grade' consecutively in 1<sup>st</sup> Cycle (2009) and 2<sup>nd</sup> Cycle (2016). # **III) UNIVERSITY ADMINISTRATION**

The Registrar is the Head of the University Administration. The present Registrar Dr. Shakeel Ahmad joined on 1<sup>st</sup> February, 2016. Presently, the University has 3 Joint Registrars, 11 Assistant Registrars, 2 Assistant Directors, 30 Section Officers and 2 Assistant Accounts Officers apart from 100 Administrative, Technical and IT Supporting Staff.

The following depicts the functioning of various Departments and Sections of the University Administration. In addition to the above, it is further, supported by academic administrators for both policy framework and implementation strategy in delivering the services more effectively with transparency and accountability.

#### GOVERNANCE

Governance is the main important functional unit of the University to shape institutional priorities and practices in terms of policy, implementation and monitoring the assets, finances, procurement, human resources, public relations, information management, documentation and support services in addition to planning and development, which requires constant teamwork, coordination and communication. The performance depends on maintaining the prolonged collaborations and productive relations with a host of stakeholders, while adhering to the core values of the University. Further, an unlimited number of variations in organizational structures necessitated as the university expanded under the plan mandates of the UGC and MHRD. The most of the decisions and issues (governance, academic and research) dealt by the academic administrators are relating to rationality, credibility and authority on the basis of shared views in fulfilling the vision, mission and objectives of the University.

#### **HUMAN RESOURCES**

The University Human Resources are governed by three sections viz., E.R-I (Teaching Faculty), E.R-II (Non-Teaching Faculty) and Governance & Administration.

i. Establishment & Recruitment - I Section: This section deals with the Recruitment and Service matters in respect of University's Teaching staff of University, Polytechnic, ITI and Model School. The University has adopted the Rules & Regulations for its Teachers as prescribed by the UGC / AICTE / Govt. of India and implements its policies as amended from time to time. Apart from Recruitment of Teachers as and when vacancies arise or created, the main functions of the ER-I Section is to process the file for issue Employment Notification, conduct of Screening and Short listing of applications through properly constituted Committees and conduct of interviews. Maintenance of Service Books, Leave Records, Personal files, Nominations, Service Agreements, LTC records and other important documents related to the service matters of the Teaching Staff. The Section is also contributing its services in conducting Executive Council Meetings and other important Committee meetings. It is also looking after the queries related to Right to Information Act, Parliament Questions, Replies to Audit and various information sought by MHRD and UGC from time to time. Correspondence with MHRD / UGC on different policy matters. The Section also deals with matters of LTC, pay fixations, Leaves, Study Leaves, Duty leaves, T.A. D.A for official work, issue of No Objection Certificates as required for various purposes, Permissions to attend Orientation and Refreshers courses etc. Further, as per provision under Act and Statutes of the University the appointment of Members for Executive Council, Deans of Schools of Studies, Heads of Departments, Proctor, Chief Warden and Warden for Hostels. The Section also deals with the promotion policy as per of teaching staff under Career Advancement Scheme as per UGC Regulation 2010. The benefit of CAS extended to all the eligible Teachers of the University. Some Associate Professors promoted as Professors under CAS as per the eligibility norms laid down by UGC at its Regulations-2010. The very important records such as Seniority List, Reservation Register and Post based Register of Teaching Staff are also compiled / maintained.

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ii. Establishment & Recruitment - II Section: This Section deals with the Recruitment and Service matters in respect of University's Non-Teaching staff and Technical Staff. The University follows the Rules & Regulations of Non-Teaching staff as prescribed by the UGC/GoI and implements its policies as amended from time to time. Apart from Recruitment of Non-Teaching and Technical Staff, the main functions of the ER-II Section are to process the file for the issuance of Employment Notification, conduct of Screening and Short listing of applications through properly constituted Committees and conduct of interviews/tests. Maintenance of Service Books, Leave Records, Personal files, Nominations, Service Agreements, LTC records and other important documents related to the service matters of the Non-Teaching and Technical Staff. This Section also deals with matters of LTC; Pay fixations, Leaves, T.A. D.A for official work, issue of No Objection Certificates, Permissions to attend Training Programs/ workshops. It also deals with the promotion policy as per Modified Assured Career Progression scheme and Department Promotion Committee. Further, it maintains the very important records such as Seniority List, Reservation Register and Post based Register in respect of the Non-Teaching and Technical Staff are compiled / maintained.

**iii. Governance & Administration Section**: The A & G presently deals with Issue of general orders/notification/circulars; Process of Children Education Allowance; Process of vehicle (two /four wheelers) loans, festival and special advances; Issue of Health Card and Identity Cards of Employees; Process of Imprest, Contingencies, Security bills and advances of Headquarters, Regional Centres, Sub Regional Centres, CTEs, ITIs, Polytechnics, Model Schools. It also deals with conduct of meetings of: (1) Standing Committee of Health Scheme; (2) Medical Technical Committee and (3) Standing Committee on Policy decisions.

The other functions include Monitoring of Non Plan Budget, Professional Training and Sponsor non-teaching staff and other work as may be assigned from time to time.

#### **INFRASTRUCTURE SECTION**

The University Infrastructure section deals with the Development and Procurement of Capital Assets and its Management and is governed by the various Cells

**i.** Estate Cell: This Cell is responsible for acquisition of land from Government/Donor's at various places of Indian States to raise infrastructural facilities for academic activities and maintain the status of all records. The Cell is also responsible to enter in to lease agreement, and arrange payments and renewals, etc. for various rented buildings to accommodate Regional Centres, Sub-Regional Centres, ITI, Polytechnic, CTE and Model School at Off - campuses of various States in India. In addition, allotment of Buildings to Departments, Schools, Staff Quarters, Bank, Post Office, Canteen, and Provision shop etc., are also dealt. Further, the Estate Cell is also dealing with maintenance of Centrex connections/Toll-free connection in the campus.

**ii. Housekeeping and Security Services Cell**: This Cell mainly facilitates regular supervision of housekeeping services at all buildings, areas and internal roads for provision of hygienic environment and outsources housekeeping services with large number of workforce. This will also supervise the University Security Services and Outsource the required workforce.

**iii. Campus Development Cell**: This Cell look after the construction of roads and fencing/ boundary wall, landscape development, laying of sewerage lines, provision of electricity and water in addition to their augmentation. Installation of electricity substation/transformers alternate power supply in addition to provision of safe drinking water facilities. This also look after the renovation facilities and ambiance for a better motivating and inspiring work environment for employees and learning environment for students. This cell prioritizes the energy and water conservation measures and facilitates the enabling environment for PwD's, which includes creation of ramps, provision of lifts and accessible toilets. Further it will also cover any other item which the university can justify on the basis of expert opinion under Campus Development, however where construction is involved the provision will be drawn from the buildings allocation of 50% of the total financial outlay during the plan period. This cell also maintains lawnmover, cutters etc., for completing the tasks in a proper way. Further, it prioritized to develop and expand green cover in the campus.

**iv. Buildings Division Cell**: This Cell is responsible for preparation of plans, estimates and construction of various building projects that includes academic, administrative and amenities purpose as per the UGC norms and the estimates for all building projects of the University not to exceed the 50% of total financial outlay of the plan period. This Cell executes all New Constructions, Extensions and Renovations (above Rs. 30 Lakhs) with the recommendation of Building Committee and Competent Authority. The Building Committee is responsible for finalizing the plans and estimates of the various building projects proposed and ensure the completion of the buildings with periodic review of the construction progress in accordance with the approved plans and estimates and proper utilization of the funds received from the UGC, the Government, and from the University's own resources. The University Buildings Division facilitates in submission of required certificates for approval and release of grants by the funding agency. If the expenditure on completion of building exceeds the amount approved by the Commission, the same are from its own resources, or re-appropriation from item(s) approved with prior approval of UGC / Funding Agency.

#### **PURCHASE & STORES SECTION**

The University facilitate Central Purchase and Procurement of Equipment, Books & Journals, Furniture, Annual Maintenance of identified services, Rate Contract of Services and Consumables (Chemicals, Stationary and Store items) for all kinds of Open and Limited Tender Processes. The success of any organization lies with time bound procurement and purchase of equipment, furniture and others to supply and installation in time to all the Departments/ Schools / Sections. The University mandates the Cell to follow centralized purchase and procurement system as per GFR and amendments from time to time. The requisitions for various items are received from different Sections, Departments, Schools etc., after due approval of competent authority in addition to budget allocation and provisions. All the purchases are carried out as per norms. Major purchases / procurement in a financial year include Equipment and Furniture to newly established Schools, Departments and Sections in addition to consumables such as Printing and supply of Self Learning Material (Books, Assignments, Prospectus) for DDE; Answer Booklets for Examination Branch; Prospectus for Admission to various courses offered by the University;

### FINANCE & ACCOUNTS SECTION

The University Finances is Sourced, Generated, Maintained and Operated by the different Units of the Finance section. The University is largely dependent on various grants sanctioned by the GoI and UGC. Besides this, University generates its internal resources in the form of fee collected from students, interest earned and from various funding agencies under different heads. This section has various Cells, which includes Salaries & Personal Claims, Bills and Cheques, Budget & Accounts, IRG and Internal Audit etc.,

**Internal Audit Cell:** The Internal Audit Cell works under the direct control of the Vice Chancellor with a staff of one Internal Audit Officer and four Internal Auditors appointed on deputation basis. Superannuated employees of Audit Department are engaged as Internal Auditors on deputation basis. It is assigned with duties of pre-audit of payments of more than Rs.50,000/-, review of high value transactions and agreements. The Department conducts regular review of Vouchers of Finance & Accounts and conducts post-audit of Departments, Centres, Colleges and Schools. IAO is also special invitee for committees of procurement of goods/services. All tender documents are vetted by IAO before finalization

#### **PUBLIC RELATIONS SECTION**

The University Public Relations is an important section consists of various cells to perform the different activities that enhances the brand image of the University. These cells facilitate the liaison work with various agencies including press and event management at University.

- i. Media Relations Cell: The objective of media cell is to maintain the relations with print and electronic media to propagate and publicise the activities of the MANUU. Press notes and various notifications are released by the cell with the approval of the competent authority are being published not only in the national English dailies and prominent vernacular language papers but also to prominent websites that posts MANUU's news and photographs. Further, it is covered by well-known national and international news agencies. The cell is entrusted with publishing of University Magazine (Al-Kalam) and also to design brochure for University Profile.
- **ii.** Event Management Cell: It will facilitate the various University events and also to assist other Departments, Schools and Centres in successful conduct of their events such as Conferences/Seminars/ Symposia/ Workshops/ Guest Lectures of eminent personalities etc., and also record the Diary of Events of the University.
- **iii. Travel Desk and Guest Relations Cell**: This Cell will facilitate the Travel Plans and Reservations of University Officials and Guests in addition to accommodation arrangements in Guest House etc.,
- **iv. Transportation Cell**: The University Transportation Cell maintain the status of University Vehicle, especially the log books and also allocation Vehicles to various Statutory Officers of the University. This also facilitate the hiring of Vehicles as and when needed and also can go for annual rate contract process for hiring of vehicles. It will also justify the number of vehicles for University needs.

#### PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT SECTION

Good Planning and Development Activities contributes for the organized growth of the University in a methodical manner by establishing clear links between past, present and future initiatives. Planning is a process of setting Goals, formulating strategies, determining the needs, allocating the resources and outlining the implementation arrangements for various developmental activities. Development includes enhancing the institutional effectiveness and performance in terms of academics, research, outreach, governance, infrastructure, finances and human resources in addition to information management system. The Office of University Planning and Development is responsible for the growth of the University assets plan and defining the long-range physical vision of each of the university campuses and plays an essential role in management of organizational setup of the University's Development Programs and offers support for decision making in order to accomplish and advance both academically and administratively through reforms.

As per the Order No. MANUU/Admn.& Gov.-III/F.108/2013-14/732, dated 30.10.2013 Development Cell was established in MANUU to look after the proposals for sanction of development grants under plan by the UGC and other funding agencies. Later, the Development Cell was abolished and it was renamed as Planning and Development in 2016.

The Planning & Development cell has been expanded as a section and allotted Room. No. 210 & 211 in the  $2^{nd}$  floor of the Administrative Building and functioning from there.

This section is entrusted with the subjects viz., UGC/ MHRD communications, general development assistance under plan, preparation of developmental plans, proposals relating to sanction of teaching and non-teaching posts etc., establishment of new Institutions, Parliamentary replies, Visitor's Meetings and Conferences, ATR, Institutional Projects, UGC schemes and any other work from authority from time to time. In addition to this it is also vetting of audit queries, RTI replies of concerned subjects handled by the section etc.,

**Prof. A. Ravinder Nath** has been appointed as **Officer on Special Duty** (**P&D**) from Osmania University on deputation basis. He joined the University on 09.05.2016. Subsequently, he has been assigned the charge of Dean, Academics. Further, it deals with the MoU's with other Institutions/Organizations/Agencies at National and International level.

#### Activities Report during the Year 2016-17

It is also associated with the **Documentation and Records** (decisions, circulars, notices), which is one of the important activities of the University. In addition to the above also involved in developing manuals, annual report etc., and also planning to maintain the archives and records through information management system. It is also entrusted with additional responsibilities of NIRF, Statistical Cell and AISHE.

#### MANUU SATELLITE CAMPUSES SECTION

**Satellite / Off-Campuses Section:** The University established Satellite / Off-campus Section on the lines of College Development Council, as envisaged by the UGC for effective coordination among various administrative and academic constituents of the University. These satellite / off-campus colleges / institutions are spread over in 11 States in the Country with more than 17 institutions (3 Model Schools, 2 ITI's, 2 polytechnics and 8 CTE's and 2 Colleges of Arts & Sciences – 1 for Women and other for Co-education) as satellite campuses in addition to 9 regional centers, 5 sub-regional centers and 164 study centers. The active participation of this division is a welcome step in the direction of improvement of standards of higher education. The efforts of such a body expected bear fruit only if fullest cooperation of and help is ensured between the existing machinery in the Universities and Constituent Colleges established outside the University Main campus as per UGC norms.

The Satellite/Off-campus programs are in consistent with the educational objectives of the University; Further to ensure and maintain the same academic standards of courses and programs offered on main campus; receive sufficient support for instructional and other needs; and have reasonable access to appropriate learning resources. It will Coordinate with the University Estate Cell regarding the acquired or donated or allotted assets both movable and immovable property with the entire land roads and building shall stand as transferred to the University and shall be treated as University property in all the records maintained by the revenue department subject to the approval of the respective State Government.

#### SUPPORT SERVICES

This is one of the important divisions of the University providing both Administrative Support Services and Student Support Services in addition to Central Support Services.

- i. Administrative Support Services: This includes Hindi Cell, Legal Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Internal Complaints Committee, RTI Cell, etc.,
- **ii. Student Support Services**: This includes Student Welfare Office, Proctor Office, Provosts Office, Equal Opportunity Center, SC/ST Cell, OBC Cell, Minorities Cell and Women's Cell, Coaching Academy, Placement and Training Center, Entrepreneurship Development Cell, NSS Cell, Center for Sports and Games etc.,
- **iii. Central Support Services**: This includes Central Library Facilities, Center for Information Technology, Instructional Media Center, Directorate of Translation and Publication, Recreation Center, Health Center etc.,

#### ACADEMICS

Academics is one of the important functional activity that is instrumental for university's brand image through developing perception, knowledge, skills and problem-solving abilities of students among various disciplines or courses offered by the Departments, Schools, Colleges and Institutes. This is helpful in discovering the talent and producing intellectuals, leaders, professionals and researchers to the society. This mainly associated with the affairs of education, research and extension activities of various Departments, Schools, Colleges and Institutes with respect to regional, national and global perspectives. This section has to function in coordination with other important functional Units primarily such as Central Admission Section, Examination Section, Directorate of Distance Education and Internal Quality Assurance Cell and also Schools of Studies and Academic Departments. Further, it is to be associated with the other central supporting functional organs of the University such as University Library, Instructional Media Center, Center for Information Technology etc., in addition to the other centers that are instrumental in performing the academic and research activities.

Academic Division of a University is directly responsible for formulating the policies and regulations of all academic programs offered by the Institution, which has great impact on the effectiveness of University functioning especially in the development of uniform structure for curriculum design and improved practices in delivery of instruction and central coordination of the educational program. The Academic Division is engaged in implementation of academic policies of the University as per the Statutes, Academic Ordinances and Regulations of the University in consonance with the notifications issued by the University Grants Commission and other regulatory bodies viz., AICTE, NCTVET, NCTE, etc., from time to time. This division also extends Student Support Services and facilitates student's admission and other affairs from within the country as well as foreign students. Further, the major part of the time and effort is dedicated to monitor curricula, courses, methods of instruction and academic progress of the students through various Departments and Schools and to sensitize the faculty in changing educational thought and practice, with particular reference to revise curriculum and modify courses of study to meet the present trends in higher education. The universities of sufficient size and share, requires appoints a full-time services of an administrator, who have notions about university academic programs, regulations, personnel and the necessary operational philosophy. In cooperation with the departments concerned, nominating members of the teaching staff to various boards and committees on the recommendation of the respective schools.

Administrator of Academic Affairs serves as chairman or all sub-committees working in the instructional program and that some times he also serves in a consultative capacity. Universities are identified as hub of intellectual acumen who are, in many cases, specialists in their particular areas of learning and they possess concepts and a philosophy of education which consider the university in its total role as an institution of higher learning. Further, he may consult with various deans of schools or heads of departments to assist in the proper disposition of some problems, but the final decision must lie on the authority executing the affairs. Decisions reached with the aid of consensus will be more easily administered since there is some assurance of agreement and harmony prior to announcement of the decision.


#### **ADMISSIONS DIVISION**

Subsequently, it was entrusted to switch over to online admission mode, so as to enhance the educational opportunities available at MANUU to a prospective student through online access for admission registration and application forms. This further necessitated to simplify the formats for easy facilitation and also access to complete the process of filling and submission of application online at minimal amount of time and effort.

The CAC was provided with sufficient supporting staff to enable the admissions to completed in stipulates time with sufficient notice and opportunity for aspiring students. #### **GRAPHICAL REPRESENTATION OF STUDENT ENROLMENT – U.G. PROGRAMMES: -**





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

#### INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE CELL

Maulana Azad National Urdu University in its process of accreditation and based on the recommendation of National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) in the year 2009 to identify the benchmarks required for achieving the quality and also to fulfill all the aspects of NAAC criteria. Thus, it has been realized that the IQAC has an important role to play in improving the performance of academic and administrative activities of the University in tune with the quality parameters.

The academic, administrative, research and outreach activities carried out by the faculty and staff of the university is assessed periodically by internal committee through academic audit as well as by external peers as their inputs and valuable suggestions boost confidence of faculty and administration to implement necessary intervention measures to improve overall performance and standards of quality in accreditation process. The IQAC of the university has evolved a strategy to ascertain and ensure all the quality parameters indicated in the quality manual for Universities by NAAC. Further, it is entrusted to carry out the stringent quality assessment measures for evaluating the performance with the help of an external academic and industry experts. It is also involved in organizing workshops periodically on quality benchmarks, to sensitize the faculty of their role and responsibilities to achieve academic standards in the competitive educational environment.

The University undergone with the evaluation exercise in its 2 cycles of accreditation process and awarded 'A' Grade by NAAC during 2009 and 2016 respectively. The IQAC is actively functional and prepares Annual Quality Assurance Reports (AQAR's) and Evaluative Reports of the Departments periodically and place before the IQAC before it is being uploaded on the University website.

#### RESEARCH

Research is an essential component of Higher Education and a special emphasis has been made in National Policy on Education. Research and Development are the indicators for advancement and prosperity for any organization. Research is a systematic scientific activity designed to develop or contribute for knowledge creation in designing and devising new applications with the help of instruments, procedures, experiments and systems in place to collect data for documentation, gather information for discovery, analyze, interpret and validate the facts for finding solutions that can be generalized for human welfare and benefits.

The research creates new knowledge, insight and imparts excitement and dynamism to the growth of educational process. The development is not a thing to be waited for and is a thing to be achieved, which is a part of investment and contribution of individuals and collective team efforts. The University system has to encourage the research in all fields of science, engineering, technology, social sciences, humanities and arts for innovations, inventions, interactions for industrial growth in the respective region. It is viewed as an innovative way of accomplishing things, of doing things of better, of discovering new relationship among facts. Further, it is the exploration of unknown through exposure, observations, experimentation and other forms of systematic enquiry followed by an objective and penetrating analysis and formulation of conclusions. The main research potential in universities and institutions are the availability of most talented faculty and fresh young minds constantly entering the field in an atmosphere of freedom and multidisciplinary environment.

In view of the above, a separate division in the University structure facilitates the research projects and innovation clubs and also administers externally funded contracts, donations, endowments and grants for and on behalf of the University. It helps to strive for careful and judicious management of resources to achieve the productivity in addition to being accountable to the public and government.

The University started the School of Languages, Linguistics and Indology in the year 1999 to establish standards for educational programs offered under various Languages.







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### XIII) SUPPORTING CENTRES

### ii) CENTRE FOR INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY (CIT)

The CIT was established with the objective of introduction of ICT with a fully integrated information management system that will allow delivering and supporting educational services to student, faculty and support authorities. The CIT promotes and facilitates transformation and standardization of information management system and also centralize and standardize data storage and also caters ICT requirements to provide computing facilities to stakeholders. The CIT evolved from small facility to a critical central facility. Keeping its ethos of education and research with modernization, the University has been leveraging ICT as a tool to induce strategic improvement and changes in the system.

To realize the above, MANUU has formulated the following mission statements:

- To provide internet enabled computing facilities to faculty, students and staff of the university. To build and maintain a state-of-the-art Campus-wide Network with adequate Wi-Fi facilities.
- To develop and manage an E-Governance (ERP) system that streamlines and automates the university's academic & administrative processes in innovative ways and support information requirement for effective decision making.
- To leverage university's E-Governance System for undertaking specific data analytics for performance analysis and quality improvement. To establish electronic links and web-conferencing system between MANUU Hyderabad and its Satellite/Regional Campuses/Sub-regional Centres located in different parts of the country for conducting remote meetings, for saving time and resources.To setup Virtual Classrooms for Satellite Campus/Regional Centres/Sub-Regional Centres and students of Distance Education.
- To promote MOOCs and provide congenial technical environment for their effective delivery to MANUU's students and faculty members.
- To reduce consumption of papers by integrating E-Mail facilities with University's administrative & academic functioning. To undertake scientific/custom software development for researchers and/or specific requirements of the university.
- To develop and maintain a dynamic, multilingual, disabled-friendly and adaptive university portal in 3 languages viz. Urdu, Hindi and English.
- To establish Intranet Services for meeting local software and data requirements of the University users and to develop and maintain a 24x7 IP-based surveillance system in MANUU Campuses. To establish and maintain an IP-PBX System for voice communication. To setup IT Helpdesk for University Users.To frequently organize ICT capacity development programs for faculty members, students and other staff.

In view of the above, the MANUU proposes to refurbish the Centre for Information Technology and create a team of ICT Professionals organized in five Technical Groups viz., e-governance, ICT help desk, data center, web services and network security. This will support effectively for converting the University Campus into Smart Campus as envisaged under Digital India Program of Government of India.

### iii) INSTRUCTIONAL MEDIA CENTRE (IMC)

The Instructional Media Centre (IMC) is an initiative taken up by MANUU to enrich its Distance and Conventional Education with media components based on audio, video, Radio, TV and multimedia. IMC has been producing curriculum based programmes, educational documentaries targeting wide Urdu audience, as well as programmes for special occasions. ### iv) DIRECTORATE OF TRANSLATION AND PUBLICATIONS (DTP)

The establishment of Directorate of Translation and Publications (DTP) is a vital initiative towards achieving the objective of the Urdu medium of instruction mandated to Maulana Azad National Urdu University. The basic objective of the establishment of our University as enshrined in the MANUU Act is to promote and develop Urdu language, impart education and training in vocational and technical subjects through Urdu medium and provide wider access to people desirous of pursuing programmes of higher education and training in Urdu medium. Today, apart from languages, the University is offering courses in social science, commerce and management, science and technology and in other contemporary disciplines. Moreover, through distance mode too, the University is offering various UG and PG courses where the language of instruction is also Urdu only. However, the insufficiency or rather unavailability of essential books in this wide range of subjects has been a stumbling block in the way of teaching and learning. In relation to the publication of Urdu books in the scientific and modern streams of knowledge, the scenario is not different at national or global levels. It is relevant to underscore that even though Urdu books are being published in India or elsewhere, they mostly cover fiction, poetry, literacy criticism, politics, Islam and Muslim culture etc., publications in the field of science, social science, commerce or in other contemporary disciplines are very meagre. Little efforts have been made in the area of textbooks production for Urdu medium students that are a must to enhance their education and intellectual progress.

It is indispensible to cater to the educational needs of the students and hence arrange for all basic materials and text books required for various discplines and courses being run by the university through both on-campus and distance mode of education. Moreover, it is also mandatory to keep an effective mechanism in place to get the course books periodically reviewed and republish them to keep learning materials updated. Keeping in view these very objectives, the university established "Directorate of Translation and Publications" January in 2016.

Since its inception, the Directorate of Translation and Publications (DTP) has taken up the responsibilities associated with production and publications of different course books and materials based on the syllabi of various courses being run by MANUU. In case the essential books/materials are in other languages, the directorate manages to translate them into Urdu. It also plans to arrange to prepare and publish books of all streams and genres, translate famous books from different languages into Urdu as well as to reproduce important Urdu books which have gone out of print to help the Urdu medium students, teacher and Urdu loving people enhance their knowledge and erudition in varied fields of learning.

The Directorate also publishes a biannual research and refereed journal "Adab-o-Saafat" which is dedicated to the promotion of Urdu Language, Literature and Culture under the patronage of the Vice Chancellor and the Prof Vice Chancellor. So far, five issues of the journal have been published. The journal is included UGC's refereed journals' list.

Teh Directorate may also publish the books on various subjects written by the faculties of the University and procure ISBNs for them. If essential, the directorate may explore and identify the thrust areas with the help of departments and external experts wherein books and materials need to be developed and published.

## vi) INTERNAL COMPLAINTS COMMITTEE

The university is committed to zero tolerance towards sexual harassment. In pursuance of the judgement of Hon'ble Supreme Court of India in Visakha vs. State of Rajasthan, dated 13 th August, 1997, the University constituted a Committee vide Order No. MANUU/Admn.I/F.38/A/2010-11/66 dated 8<sup>th</sup> April 2011. # XIV) TRAINING CENTRES

**i**)

#### UGC – HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT CENTRE (HRDC)

The University Grants Commission has sanctioned a UGC Academic Staff College to Maulana Azad National Urdu University in January 2007. The UGC-ASC was inaugurated by Prof. Moolchand Sharma, *Vice-Chairperson*, University Grants Commission on 24<sup>th</sup> March 2007. The UGC Academic Staff College, Maulana Azad National Urdu University started its mission in March 2007 and has devoted itself to training and professional development of College and University teachers, Principals and Academic Administrators, non teaching staff and also research scholars. The ASC is renamed as Human Resource Development Centre in February 2015.

HRDC. MANUU is a platform for teachers and intellectuals of diverse disciplines. The programs focus to update knowledge and skills in their specialized subjects, competent enough to face global challenges in Higher Education. HRDC is making consistent effort to mission achieve its by offering diversified programs and through that to enhance the teaching capabilities of



participants. The HRDC planned its programmes to incorporate all the components prescribed by UGC and other aspects relevant to its vision and mission.

The prime objective of the HRDC as envisaged in guidelines is to provide a platform for the teachers for professional development and their sensitization to quality of higher education and socio-economic and national development issues. Our HRDC programmes are aligned with these objectives, with an objective to ensure that teachers are updated in terms of latest knowledge in the subject, socio-economic and national development issues; new teaching and research methods.

Academic Activities: The UGC Academic Staff College has so far organised 30 Orientation Programmes, 77 Refresher Courses and 28 Professional Development Programmes for Educational Administrators, Principals, Teaching and non-teaching staff till 31.03.2017. In the academic year 2016-17, the UGC, HRDC has organized 3 Orientation Programmes 4 Refresher Courses and 3 Professional Development Programmes. Total **377** participants attended these courses. Academic Achievement: NAAC has ranked HRDC, MANUU 11<sup>th</sup> position out of 66 HRDC in all India. HRDC, MANUU stood 2<sup>nd</sup> in the A.P State based on the grade point.It stood 4<sup>th</sup> in South India.

#### ii) CSE RESIDENTIAL COACHING ACADEMY

Civil Services Coaching Academy was established in 2009 to impart coaching to the aspirants of competitive examinations. This Academy caters to the candidates belonging to minorities, SC/ST communities and women. The Academy has conducted 16 coaching programmes under which around 650 candidates have been benefitted.The candidates who have availed coaching from the Academy have



been successful in seeking employment through Banking Recruitment, State Public Service Commissions, Teachers Recruitment, and in other Multinational Companies (MNCs).During year 2015-16, eighty two candidates took coaching for Civil Services Preliminary Examination from the Academy, out of which 6 candidates qualified in the Civil Services Preliminary Examination, conducted by UPSC. One of our participants got selected in Indian Forest Service.The Academy has engaged eminent Resource Persons to impart coaching to the aspirants of Competitive Examinations.

# iii) CENTRE FOR PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OF URDU MEDIUM TEACHERS (CPDUMT)

Centre for Professional Development of Urdu Medium Teachers (CPDUMT) was established in October 2006 to enable in-service Urdu language teachers, teachers of Urdu medium schools and *madrasas* to acquire and improve the art of effective teaching and to keep them abreast of the latest developments in pedagogy. The CPDUMT conducts various activities aiming at professional development of Urdu teachers/Urdu medium teachers of schools and *madrasas*. The Centre has two-pronged objectives: To keep teachers abreast of the latest developments and innovations in the field of pedagogy, educational psychology and philosophy; to offer training to the *madrasa* teachers on par with the main stream teachers; to organize refresher courses for teachers in their concerned subjects to update their knowledge as per new researches and techniques; to create awareness of democracy, secularism, environment, computer, internet etc. in Urdu medium schools; to provide a forum for the Urdu medium teaching community, academicians, educationists and intellectuals for mutual interaction to sort out the problems of Urdu medium education; and to liaise with Urdu academies, SCERTs, NCERT and other public and private agencies to fulfil objectives.

The Centre has so far conducted fifty four (54) short term training programmes across the country, out of which thirty nine (39) training programmes have been conducted for Primary, Upper Primary, Secondary and Senior Secondary school teachers and fifteen (15) programmes for madrasa teachers. CPDUMT has conducted in-service training programmes in more than thirty (30) cities in six states. Training programmes have been conducted at Hyderabad, Karimnagar, Mahbubnagar, Nizamabad and Warangal in Telangana; at Aurangabad, Akola, Amravathi, Akalkuwa, Beed, Mumbai, Nanded and Parbhani in Maharashtra; at Bidar, Hubli and Raichur in Karnataka; at Calicut, Karanthur, Kannur, Kasarcode, Kollam, Malappuram, Palakkad, Thiruvananthapuram, Thrissur and Kalpetta (Wayanad) in Kerala; also at Cuttak in Odisha and at Kadappa in Andhra Pradesh. In all, two thousand eight hundred twenty three (2,823) teachers from hundreds of schools and madrasas have benefitted from CPDUMT. The Centre also conducts surveys to identify problems of Urdu medium teachers to adopt measures for their solution. The Centre introduced modern subjects like Science, Mathematics, Social Science, Information Technology, etc. in *madrasas* and ushered in modern teaching aids and approaches. The Centre evaluates its programmes based on feedback from participants at the end of each programme in the form of filled in evaluation pro-formas and consolidated reports. The consolidate reports contain performance, appraisal, opinion and suggestions of the participants to identify the skills, curricular areas and pedagogical approaches to be incorporated in the academic schedules for orientation programmes to be conducted in future.Keeping in view of the professional development of the Urdu medium teachers, a departmental library has been established which has started functioning from November 2008. The library contains a large numbers of books and subscribes different journals of education and training.

#### iv) EQUAL OPPORTUNITY CENTRE (EOC)

MANUU in line with the affirmative policy of Government of India, resolved that the affirmative policies, programs, schemes, facilities would be provided and extended to the all entitled sections of the Society. The University has set up Equal Opportunity Center to ensure the implementation of the orders issued time to time by the MHRD and UGC. This center specifically focuses to address the issues and concerns of campus community particularly targeting the SC, ST, OBC (Non-Creamy Layer) and the Minorities including persons with disabilities to eliminate the social disparities and also the gender discrimination. The UGC has been addressing national concerns of access and equity, while ensuring the standard of quality and relevance of education by implementing the policies of the Government of India and initiated several schemes that promotes social and economic equality. As a part of reformist strategies, MANUU has welcomed the move of policy makers and gave all its support to start 'Equal Opportunity Center' (EOC). Accordingly, MANUU established EOC and also appointed a Nodal Officer. Further, the EOC is supported by liaison officers of various cells (SC/ST Cell, OBC Cell, Minority Cell, PwD Cell and Women Cell) under its fold in addition to coordinators for different coaching schemes of UGC and also an Antidiscriminating Officer.

The following are the objectives of the EOC at MANUU:

- 1. To enhance access to special and varied skills.
- 2. To increase the competitive capabilities of the students.
- 3. To develop communication skills in English.
- 4. To improve the difficult component of any given subject.
- 5. To train students in Ethics and Personality Development.
- 6. To sensitize on the entitlements and opportunities.

The objectives of establishing "SC/ST Cell" are as under

- ✤ To look after the implementation of reservation policy for SCs/STs in the University
- ✤ To take such follow up measures for achieving the objectives and targets laid down for the purpose by the Government of India and U.G.C.
- To implement, monitor and evaluate continuously the reservation policy in university for ensuring effective implementation of the policy and programmes of the Government of India

The University follows reservation policy as per Govt. of India norms i.e. 15% in the case of Scheduled Castes and 7.5% for Scheduled Tribes and 27% Other Backward Classes. The Cell collects information of total number of teaching and non-teaching employees and students belonging to SC/ST/OBC Communities in the university. The detail of the collected data is forwarded to the MHRD/UGC/Other Govt. Organizations from time to time.

Incidentally, most of the students belong to the first generation and they are from the rural and marginalized background. Students come to university with varied hopes to fulfill their aspirations with a vision about life and career. In the process of elevating from 'ascribed status' to 'achieved status' one has to accept the English speaking as a social tongue for global communication, while respecting one's own mother tongue. Even though it is subjectivity of an individual, however, the university to provided a platform in fulfilling their dreams in the form of EOC. The EOC is performing a two pronged strategy for disadvantaged groups for entering into mainstream of society by protecting the rights, privileges, interests and entitlements for progression in academics and career in addition to ensuring the social inclusion.

The Equal Opportunity Center of Maulana Azad National Urdu University (MANUU) is entrusted with organizing the coaching activities under UGC Scheme.

- 1. Competitive Examinations Coaching for Entering to Services
- 2. NET Coaching for Award Fellowship or Qualifying for Lecturership
- 3. Remedial Coaching classes for needy students.

The role of EOC has been crucial in enabling the students of this University to avail the extended opportunities of both vertical and horizontal mobility in their endeavors.

## iv) NET COACHING CENTRE FOR MINORITIES

The NET Coaching Centre for Minorities was established in 2005 with an objective to provide coaching for minorities who are appearing for UGC-NET exam. The Centre organizes 45 days intensive coaching twice in May and November. The coaching for UGC NET was organized in Paper I (Common paper to all subjects) and Papers II and III (Urdu, English, Arabic, Persian, Hindi, Public Administration / Political Science, Management, Social Work, Computer Science & Application, Women's Studies, Education and Mass Communication & Journalism).

#### **v) REMEDIAL COACHING CENTRE FOR MINORITIES (RCCM)**

The UGC – Remedial Coaching Centre for Minorities (RCCM) was established in the X plan in 2006. The Centre offers Remedial Coaching for 25 hours per semester per subject to the minority students including SC, ST, and OBC. In- house faculty from MANUU, Research Scholars and faculty from local universities and colleges tutor the students to help them improve their academic performance. The Remedial Classes are held in the respective departments before or after regular classes in October-November and March-April every year. Generally, classes are conducted between 2:30 pm and 5:30 pm. The books acquired by the Centre are issued to the students for their reference. Handouts are also photocopied and distributed among the students as and when felt necessary. Reading material in the form of photostat copies is also available at the RCCM for use by the students. There is a total of 1115 number of books of which 200 are in Urdu. Audio-visual aids are available for use by the faculty engaging the remedial classes.

#### PART - IV

#### XV) DIRECTORATE OF DISTANCE EDUCATION

**The Directorate of Distance Education (DDE)** is a pioneer institute in providing distance education through Urdu medium in the country. The DDE initiated its distance education programmes from its year of inception (1998) by offering B.A. in Urdu medium initially. The University established an Instructional Media Centre for the preparation of audio-visual educational programmes. At present, recording of the Self Learning Material (SLM) for MANUU's study programmes is under full swing. The DDE has achieved its goal of providing online admission facility for all its programmes. Computers with printers, Internet and WiFi facility are provided to the entire DDE faculty.

The DDE has set up and is effectively running 14 Regional Centres (RCs) and sub-Regional Centres (SRCs) which are in turn handling a total number of 183 Study Centres and Examination Centres across the country. The Regional Centres and sub-Regional Centres are taking care of student support services; monitoring the functions of the Study Centres; admission process and other such works as communicated by the MANUU Headquarters. The RCs held the annual orientation workshop (2016-17) for the academic counsellors and coordinators. The DDE HQ's annual Calendar(2016-17) of contact classes/academic counselling for all the programmes was adopted successfully by all the Study Centres. At its headquarters, the DDE has established a Library which is well equipped with books on all subjects covering all the programmes offered by DDE under Distance Mode. Also available is a fully furnished computer lab with internet facility, a 500 seating capacity Auditorium and a Committee Room. Whereas, all the Study Centres across the country have functional class rooms to facilitate Counselling Classes for the enrolled Students, as per the University's guidelines, with the necessary books and other literature, provided by DDE HQ, to help students in their respective courses.

Academic Programmes of DDE (2016 - 2017): At present, Directorate of Distance Education is offering 11 programmes through Distance Mode (ODL). English language is offered as a compulsory course in first two years of the UG programmes. Environmental Studies is a compulsory course for all the first year UG students. Hindi is offered as a second language along with Urdu and Arabic.

#### **REGIONAL CENTRES**

The mandate of the University enable the Univrsity to offer dual mode of education viz., Regular on campus; and Distance mode through the Directorate of Distance Educatoin (DDE). The DDE has a network of Regional Centres, Sub-Regional Centres located in different parts of the country for organizing and administering the distance education programs. There is a network of 9 Regional Centres and 5 Sub-Regional Centres spread all over the country at Delhi, Patna, Bengaluru, Bhopal, Darbhanga, Mumbai, Kolkata, Ranchi, and Hyderabad.

## MANUU REGIONAL CENTRE, KOLKATA

MANUU Regional Centre, Kolkata was setup on 7<sup>th</sup> November, 2005 with jurisdiction over West Bengal, Odisha and North Eastern States of India viz. Assam, Mizoram, Meghalaya, Nagaland, Tripura, Arunachal Pradesh and Manipur. At present, the Regional Centre has twelve Study Centres. A College of Teacher Education (CTE) was established at Asansol (West Bengal) in 2013, where a two years Regular Mode and two year Distance Mode B.Ed. courses are offered. The intake is of 100 for the Program Centre at MANUU CTE, Asansol. These are bifurcated and 50 seats have been allotted to a new B.Ed. (Distance Mode) program centre at Kolkata Teacher's Training College, 24 Parganas (N).

#### MANUU REGIONAL CENTRE, RANCHI

The Regional Centre was set up in 2007 having its jurisdiction in Jharkhand. At present, Regional Centre Ranchi has been beaming swiftly with seven study centres namely Gomoh, Jamshedpur, Ranchi, Chatra, Jamtara, Hazaribagh, Bokaro. The students strength have also enhanced during the previous academic year 2015-16.Courses offered are U.G. & P.G., Diploma and Certificate courses offered by the Directorate of Distance Education, Maulana Azad National Urdu University, Hyderabad.

#### MANUU REGIONAL CENTRE, BANGALORE

The Regional Centre Bangalore was established in 1998, is involved in conduct of admissions for B.Ed (DLP) UG, P.G. Diploma and Certificate Programs, Sale of prospectus, Receipt of Admission forms, Scrutiny data entry and preparation of nominal list. Other responsibilities include receipt of examination forms from Study/Exam Centres, scrutiny of forms, conducting of examinations all over the centres, sale of prospectus for B.Ed (DLP) receipt of entrance test forms, scrutiny of received forms, conducting of Entrance Test, B.Ed admission counselling and B.Ed Term End Examinations.

#### MANUU REGIONAL CENTRE, SRINAGAR

The Regional Centre at Srinagar was established in August 2005 with the objective to impart education at the door steps of the downtrodden students especially to the candidates residing near the Line of Control and women folk and Urdu speaking people. The regional Centre has established Study Centres at boarder area – Uri, Kargil and Kumwara.
